Harry W. Smith Former Wire Editor of Evening News [1931 – 1994]

Harry W. Smith, 63, retired Evening News wire editor, died Thursday, February 3, 1994, in Polyclinic Medical Center. Smith, of Linglestown, worked for The Patriot-News Co. for 35 of his 37 years in the newspaper business. A native of Beaver, he began his newspaper career there in 1956 as a reporter with the Beaver County Times. He joined The Patriot in 1958 as a general assignment reporter and later covered City Hall. He subsequently became a copy editor and was named Patriot wire editor in 1961 and later Evening News wire editor. Henry H. Young, retired Patriot-News executive editor, said, "Harry was a hard-working and conscientious newspaperman and very, very dependable. He took pride in his work and always gave his best effort." Dale Davenport, editorial page editor and former city editor, said Smith "had a great sense of news value and a sharp eye for good feature stories. He believed that readers wanted a variety of information in their newspaper, and he looked for both important and interesting stories for his pages." "I was city editor at the time of the space shuttle Challenger explosion," Davenport noted, "and I can clearly recall Harry letting me know immediately so we could send reporters out for local reaction. His skill at piecing together the bulletins from Cape Canaveral enabled us to put out a paper that day with many of the details." Evening News copy editor Doug Dohne said Smith "was one of the last of the old-time page editors at The Patriot-News. He began as a cub reporter in the so-called hot-type days of newspapering and retired in January as a telegraph [wire] editor in the computer era." "Harry," Dohne added, "had a strong sense of responsibility to his job, which was to keep the reader abreast of the stories, though breaking half a world away, which affect us all." "Harry was a no-nonsense journalist whose solid news judgment was evident each day," said executive news editor Bob Vucic. "He was as hard a worker as he was a decent human being. We'll miss him." "He was a good friend and one heckuva newspaperman," said Leon Baden, Evening News copy editor. "He always had the reader's interests at heart." Smith was a graduate of Geneva College, Beaver Falls; a Marine Corps veteran of the Korean War; a fourth-degree member of Knights of Columbus Council 869; and a member of Holy Name of Jesus Catholic Church, Lower Paxton Twp., and Linglestown American Legion Post 272. 'Doc' fought to preserve land along Stony Creek Author: REGGIE SHEFFIELD, of The Patriot-News

Dr. John A. Fritchey, Jr. 1907-2006

The man who 40 years ago began a lonely battle to preserve a 16-mile stretch of land popular with nature lovers, hunters and anglers along Stony Creek in northern Dauphin County has died. On an obituary page last month was news of the Aug. 18th death of Dr. John A. Fritchey, Jr. of West Hanover Twp., a physician, dermatologist, son of a threetime Harrisburg mayor, fisherman, conservationist, husband and father. He was 99. "Doc" Fritchey, as he was known, is credited with beginning the movement to save the Stony Creek Valley to the north of Fort Indiantown Gap, first from a PPL plan in the mid-1960s to build a hydroelectric plant in the area. More recently, conservationists followed Fritchey's example and joined to stop the Pennsylvania National Guard's attempt to obtain more than 1,000 acres of that land for use as a safety buffer for its artillery range. The valley stretching through Dauphin and Lebanon counties, from Dauphin to south of Tower City, has long been popular for its beauty and wildlife and is known as one of the few unspoiled tracts of land that's easily reached from nearby metropolitan areas. "I always told him he was a conservationist before the word was ever invented," said his wife, Dorothy, known as Dottie to friends. "I met him in 1939. It was right before the war. He was a patient. He was going to the University of Pennsylvania graduate school," said Dottie, who was a student nurse at Polyclinic Hospital. Dottie, now 91, first helped him get over a throat infection. Then she married him. The two bought a home in West Hanover Twp. in 1948. Fritchey was a graduate of Dickinson College and the University of Pennsylvania. He ran a practice in the 700 block of North Second Street from 1940 to 1972. Fritchey celebrated the outdoors, Dottie said, having learned to enjoy its benefits as a child from his father, also a physician. But he also feared the potential harm caused to the environment by people attracted by that publicity. "The Game Commission and the PPL were fighting with him and they gave him a rough time, but he kept fighting on," Dottie Fritchey said. "He had absolutely no one to back him. He just had this crusade on his own." Bolstered by the 1972 Pennsylvania Scenic Rivers Act and in 1980 The Stony Creek Wild and Scenic River Act, which gave the valley some legal protections, Fritchey nonetheless remained wary as late as 1979. "We've had so many downs, and so few, if any, ups that it's very difficult to be optimistic until everything is in writing," Fritchey was quoted as saying in a November 1979 newspaper article. Robert Pennell of Harrisburg, the past president of the Doc Fritchey Chapter of Trout Unlimited, a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation of clean water and wild trout and salmon fisheries, last saw Fritchey just before his 99th birthday in June. The chapter was renamed in his honor for his efforts at saving Stony Valley. "Doc was one of the most persistent men that I've ever been involved with." Pennell said last week. "He wouldn't take no for an answer if he felt he was right about something. The job would get done. It might take time, but it would get done." Pennell

explained how Fritchey, who at the time was waging his one-man battle against what he felt was governmental and industrial intrusion, realized he couldn't continue to do it alone. "As he got further and further into this, he realized that maybe he needed to get the forces of a conservation-oriented organization behind him. That's when he went to Trout Unlimited," he said. "He built on that and, as more and more interest was generated to save Stony Valley, he was able to attract more and more members, and more and more members meant more and more publicity for his particular fight," Pennell said. A man of many hobbies, Fritchey made his own fishing rods. His desk at home is still strewn with the tools of a fly fisherman, his wife said. A self-taught artist, Fritchey enjoyed capturing the area's birds with paint and brush. John Fritchey 's health took a downturn after he fractured his hip at home on Father's Day. He had been fishing the day before and was, his wife believes, watching a deer on his property when he fell on a flagstone porch at his house. He died Aug. 18.
